
## "What good is the warmth of summer, without the cold of winter to give it sweetness."

Nobelius Heritage Park has been undergoing a few transformations to make it an even more enjoyable place to visit.



Recently Cardinia Shire Council has been busy providing better facilities in the way of picnic tables and seating. Post and rail fencing has also been added along with a new conifer garden bed to the west of the museum.

The swale that was installed a few years ago to alleviate drainage problems within the park is also being revamped by removing the vast amount of weeds and placing a new gravel bed along the spillway.

Future plans will include new BBQ facilities making this park an even better place to visit or enjoy a picnic.



Winter is also a good time to visit as the true growth of the trees is visible and the conifers and evergreens can display their beauty without the interference of the sometimes more majestic deciduous species.

Visitors to the park and museum will also notice other changes over the coming months.

The museum applied for a capital works grant for the supply and installation of solar panels back in March and found out recently that we were successful.



Although not open every day, the museum needs to maintain a constant temperature in order to protect the exhibits from deterioration and the solar panels will go a big way in reducing our power and heating costs.
